AAPI Commission Grants Program



- Introduced in 2021, the AAPI Commission Grants Program aims to uplift and empower Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) communities.
- Addresses challenges faced by community groups, artists, businesses, and youth organizations in securing initial funding by providing vital seed funding.
- Serves as more than financial support, acting as a beacon of opportunity for AAPI-led projects.
- Supports community-driven projects to foster cultural enrichment, economic growth, and social cohesion.
- Encourages diverse ventures, including grassroots initiatives and innovative artistic endeavors.
- Strives to nurture the vibrant contributions of AAPI communities and ensure their enduring impact.



2024 Grant Program Focus

- The Fall 2024 AAPIC Grants Program focused on supporting organizations, community groups, & individuals dedicated to serving refugees in Massachusetts.
- Eligible applicants were required to be based in Massachusetts, serve refugee populations, and operate as non-profit entities.
- This program reaffirmed AAPIC's commitment to fostering impactful work within refugee communities across the state.



Selection Process

Application

- After the 2023 Grant cycle, the Small Grants application transitioned online for efficiency. Launched in October 2024, it closed on November 11.
- Applicants had to be Massachusetts-based nonprofits serving refugees.
- After submission, applications were organized for review.

Review

- Grants selection process led in collaboration with the Commissioners Selection Committee.
- Each member of the committee independently reviewed all applicants and their submissions to ensure a fair and thorough evaluation process.

Group Discussion

- The Selection Committee reviewed 42 applicants in a Zoom meeting, discussing rankings and funding decisions.
- To streamline the process, the top 20 candidates were organized quantitatively for the final selection.

Final Selection


- Out of the top 20 candidates, 9 were selected for funding by the Commissioners on the Selection Committee.
- The final list was presented at the December 10, 2024, AAPI Commission meeting, where the full Commission approved the funding. Grantees were then notified, and final paperwork was requested to facilitate fund disbursement, coordinated with the treasury for timely processing.


Does your project directly serve refugees?



Nonprofit, Community Group, or Individual




Does your project directly serve refugees?


Have you received funding from the AAPI Commission since 2020?





Purpose for Funding

Advocacy for Refugee & Immigrant Services for Empowerment (ARISE)	Education <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Training college students as Refugee Advocates to assist refugee families during resettlement processes, and provide personalized, long-term guidance tailored to each family's unique needs.
Asian American Resource Workshop (AARW)	Education, Events, Program Initiatives/Development, Direct Aid <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Leadership development, political education, and skills training for Southeast Asian refugee and immigrant community members to address impacts of mass detention, deportation, and strengthen legal and organizing capacities.
Boston New Hope Academy	Education <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provide stipends for high school tutors offering free sessions for children in Lynn, Lowell, and National Guard shelters
Boston Refugee Youth Enrichment Program	Events, Program Initiatives/Development <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Support a cultural heritage program empowering Afghan and Vietnamese youth through site visits, arts, and literature
Massachusetts Baptist Multicultural Ministries (MBMM) Inc.	Program Initiatives/Development <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Enhance the Refugee School Impact project, offering tailored academic and cultural integration programs for refugee children and parents, including ELL support, literacy education, and after-school activities.
Massachusetts Afghan Alliance	Direct Aid, Events, Program Initiatives/Development <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Assist compliance and growth, support Afghan refugee families, and host cultural events like Eid and Nowruz while raising awareness of refugee community contributions
Political Asylum Immigration Representation (PAIR) Project	Direct Free Legal Services for Asylum Seekers <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provide pro bono legal services for AAPI asylum seekers, focusing on Afghan Refugee Project clients
Proleung Khmer: A 50-year Journey of Remembrance and Resilience	Arts & Culture, Education, Events <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Support a 50-year commemoration of Khmer resilience and cultural identity through a series of historical and celebratory events in April-May 2025
Vong Tay Cha Me Viet / The Circle of Vietnamese Parents	Education, Program Initiatives/Development <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Create a bilingual online platform to support Vietnamese parents of children with disabilities, offering culturally relevant training on life transitions, advocacy, and self-care.




