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5. Key Issue Area Determination ([link](#))

- a. Emailed Jennifer regarding proposing mental health, housing, and language access as key issue areas for commission vote

The importance of advocating for AAPI communities through hearings and surveys was discussed. Hybrid approaches involving collaboration between community-based organizations and government entities were emphasized. Strategies for engaging the community in urban planning were shared, including identifying the target audience, providing clear information, and partnering with trusted organizations. Speakers also discussed effective ways to engage the community in public hearings, such as understanding their needs and concerns, bringing in subject matter experts, and considering cost-saving measures like childcare. Overall, the conversation highlighted the need for inclusive and effective public engagement processes to serve AAPI communities.

Community engagement strategies for public hearings.

- Candice Cho discusses strategies for engaging diverse communities in public hearings.
- Community-based organization seeks to make public hearings more accessible and engaging for marginalized communities.
- Candice Cho (she/her) emphasizes accessibility and inclusivity in community events.
- Organizers collect contact information, follow up after events, and prioritize language access.

Accessible public hearings for marginalized communities.

- Candice Cho (she/her) emphasizes the importance of language access in policy work, using examples from her organization's experience.
- Cho and others discuss the use of professional translators and interpreters in public spaces, and the importance of community involvement in ensuring accessibility.
- Karen Chen and Candice Cho discussed their experiences working with Chinese progressive associations in Boston and New York.
- Shubhecchha Dhaurali appreciated the format of the listening session and found it helpful in considering key aspects for future events.

Challenges in getting government officials to attend community meetings.

- Saatvik Ahluwalia (He/Him): Wants hearings to create accountability, parse possibilities.
- Candice Cho (she/her): Easy to get local/state govt agencies to come, answer questions.
- Candice Cho and team leverage personal relationships with elected



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officials and bureaucrats to bring them to community spaces.

- Finding the right person to talk to on the government side, who can communicate effectively with non-experts, is crucial for community partnerships.

AAPI community engagement and public hearings.

- Javan Santos highlights importance of relationship building with elected officials in AAPI advocacy.
- Candice Cho and Shubhecchha Dhaurali discuss next steps for public hearings with Saatvik Ahluwalia and Karen Chen.
- Karen Chen and Shubhecchha Dhaurali discuss follow-up actions after listening sessions to ensure community members receive resources they need.
- Commissioners debate approach to engaging community members, considering existing organizational structures and resource availability.

Public hearings, community input, and solving problems.

- Saatvik Ahluwalia suggests using community members' experiences to inform public hearing on mental health access.
- Discussion on holding public hearings to gather community input on mental health access and potential barriers.

Community health equity survey results and potential hearing on policy issues.

- Community members share personal stories and seek help from officials during listening sessions.
- Karen Chen and others discuss legislative aides' roles in policy-making, including community outreach and recommendation development.
- Saatvik and Shubhecchha discuss the Women's Commission hearing and survey results.
- Shubhecchha Dhaurali shares survey results on key issues for a community college.
